From the President: Erik Ladner

Welcome to the Iowa World Language Association Bulletin. If you are a first-time reader of our newsletter, the IWLA is an organization that represents the teachers of world languages in Iowa's elementary, secondary and post-secondary schools. This organization has for nearly 30 years been a voice for the role of world languages and cultures in the curricula of Iowa's schools, serving as a resource for teachers and as an advocate for our discipline on a local and state level. Our role is highlighted annually at our organization's state convention, which was held October 7-8 in the Downtown Marriot Hotel in Des Moines. We are pleased to say that our convention was a great success, thanks in large part to the efforts of the IWLA Executive Board and the many teachers and professors that presented their creative and innovative teaching strategies to the members of our organization through the various workshops and presentations they chose to share with us.

As the new president of the IWLA, I would like to introduce myself a bit. I have been a member of the IWLA (formerly the IFLA) since 1995, with a 5-year hiatus while I was living in Texas while pursuing my doctorate in Spanish Literature. I still remember my first attendance to the then-IFLA convention in 1995 -I was a Master's student at the University of Northern Iowa, attending the conference as one of the many TA's in the Department of Modern Languages. As a brand-new graduate student that had never taught a course in Spanish, the conference was for me a learning experience in that I had the opportunity to see the many unique and exciting activities that experienced teachers came to share with new teachers. Just as important was the fact that in the then-IFLA I came to know so many teachers (many who still attend the conference to this day and I now have the honor of calling colleagues) who have inspired me, and continue to inspire me to this day. In the years since my Master's degree I have taught at a community college in Nebraska, as a TA at the University of Texas at Austin, as a lecturer at Iowa State University, and now as an Assistant Professor of Spanish at Central College. When I had the fortune to return to Iowa seven years ago, I immediately renewed my participation in the IWLA and found that the community I had left behind was still as strong as before, filled with dedicated teachers that still serve as role models for younger teachers beginning their careers.

As an organization the IWLA still works on behalf of teachers of world languages in several different ways. During 2011 the organization, represented through the Executive Committee, has continued our advocacy campaign to argue for a greater role for world languages in Iowa's K-12 curriculum. Last spring several members of the Executive Committee met with Jason Glass, Director of the Iowa Department of Education, to continue to advocate for the reinstating of a world language representative in the DOE. The current financial crisis has made funding this position impossible at this time, though we are hopeful that in the foreseeable future that such a position may be developed and funded. Out of our conversations with Director Glass also came a call for us to articulate the place of world languages in the Iowa Curriculum and means for assessment. These are conversations we are beginning to have as an organization and will continue to have in the months and years to come.

One of the exciting announcements that came from our recent conference has been the development of a new award, the Michael Oates Teacher of Promise (TOP) Award. This award is in memory of Michael Oates, a longtime professor of French at the University of Northern Iowa. I had the honor of being one of Mike's students while I was at UNI, and the fact that an award of this type was named for him could not have been more appropriate, given how much he did during the course of his career to nurture new teachers of world languages. The Michael Oates TOP award is an award designed to support student teachers of promise as they prepare to leave their college programs and begin their careers in teaching world languages. To be eligible, a student must be either in the process of student teaching or have just completed student teaching through a teacher-training program in Iowa. Nominations may be made by either cooperating teachers or by foreign language methods professors. I look forward to working with you as president of the IWLA during the coming year. Given the sense of community that the IWLA has offered me as a world language teacher, it is my hope that I may be a good steward of this organization and do what I can to extend this sense of community to you, my colleagues, into the new year.

-Welcome to Kim Huegrich! Thank you for being willing to serve.

-Conference went really well overall. Thanks for all the work to everyone. Added 6 more sessions than last year. We may want to consider getting more rooms. It may not be necessary to get more. For the numbers of attendees, it seems an appropriate number of sessions. Could add poster session, where the cost would be the easels.

Exhibits - Need to double check on 8 foot tables. but some were 6. Work of Our Hands didn't have enough room. Some tables were 10 foot. The size of tables will affect how many are ordered. Recommend don't raise the price for the booths, but don't like them leaving early on Saturday or not staying for Saturday. Pearson Prentice Hall, Interact, and others left in the afternoon on Friday. Would it help having a later exhibit break at noon'ish? We moved it earlier so some would still go. Some vendors bought less space. Plata Fina hasn't come for the last 2 years saying it doesn't work for them. Originally may have had issues because of the shift in weekends. Originally contacted them in May, e-mail over the summer, some were confirmed just before the conference. Northwestern College may be interested in exhibiting next year.

-Garage sale issue was last minute. The hotel moved her items down from her room, but she should have bought a booth. Years ago, people have sold their materials before, but it was by word of mouth and there was no attempt to advertise. Could add to website/e-mail blast, if people want to sell things, have an exhibitor space. IWLA Garage Sale. Money raised for scholarships, grants, etc. Emeritus group could do this. They were interested in fundraising for scholarships. Dealing with the leftovers is difficult though. Some may actually want to sell stuff. Need to avoid what happened this year. -Julie and Regina will not be doing exhibits next year. Have done it for 5 years. Should search for new exhibit chairs. They recommend 2 people. An additional membership person would be helpful. Wade will make sure all the slates are filled. If registration automation is possible, that will make the process a lot easier for Bea, then would just be matching checks. Some schools were interested in paying online. Maybe Paulino could set up the payment option on the website. It could be an issue if Wild Apricot is a Canadian company, transferring of funds internationally and conversion fee could be involved. -373 registered for the conference total. Tonglu Li and Amy van der Meer were the winners of the free memberships. 358 Fri/Sat, Sat only 14. Vegetarian meals 19. Early registration 136. Regular regis. 92. Onsite 42. Students 56. The following organizations are offering study-abroad scholarships through Central States for the summer of 2012. Please note the deadline is December 15, 2012. If you could forward this information to your state organizations or colleagues, please do it ASAP!

Strangely enough, we often do not get many applicants for these scholarships, and they go unused. Needless to say, we want to see these opportunities go to deserving teachers in our region!

CSCTFL Scholarship Opportunities Centro MundoLengua Scholarship for AP Teachers in Spain www.centromundolengua.com June 24 - July 7, 2012

This scholarship is intended to provide an immersion experience for an AP Spanish teacher in a public or private K-12 Spanish program who has shown professional commitment to, and sustained involvement in, the teaching of the Spanish language and culture. This scholarship includes two weeks of class instruction in Seville, Spain, full room and board with a Spanish family in a private room, class materials, certificate, cultural activities in Seville, and a welcome breakfast and farewell dinner. Note that the recipient of the scholarship is responsible for transportation to the study site and for personal expenses. Graduate credits are extra.

Centro MundoLengua AP Language or AP Literature Summer Institute www.centromundolengua.com June 24 - July 7, 2012

Centro MundoLengua is also offering a scholarship for the AP Language or for the AP Literature Summer Institute. Centro MundoLengua has provided the only accredited AP Summer Institute for Spanish language and literature teachers in Spain.

After completing either of these two programs, the recipient is required to present a session at the

2013 Central States Conference, sharing information and materials obtained from the experience.

Cemanahuac Educational Community in Mexico Scholarship

This scholarship is intended to provide an immersion experience for a teacher in a public or private K-12 Spanish program who has shown professional commitment to, and sustained involvement in, the teaching of Spanish language and culture. The dollar value of this award in 2012 will be \$1083.00, and includes registration, tuition for two weeks, housing (double occupancy) with all meals, and one all-day field study trip. Other expenses, in addition to airfare, that the recipient would have to cover on his/her own would be transfer to Cuernavaca (about \$15 each way), a textbook (\$35) and personal expenses. The recipient can attend any program at the Cemanahuac Educational Community in Mexico anytime during 2012. After completing this experience, the recipient is required to present a session at the 2013 Central States Conference, sharing information and materials obtained from the experience. Preference for this award will be given to non-native speakers of Spanish.

Universidad Internacional: Center for Linguistic & Multicultural Studies

This scholarship is intended to provide an immersion experience for a teacher in a public or private K-12 Spanish program who has shown professional commitment to, and sustained involvement in, the teaching of Spanish language and culture. This scholarship includes the registration fee and two weeks of class instruction (3 hours per day) at the Universidad Internacional in Cuernavaca, Mexico. Note that the recipient of the scholarship is responsible for transportation to the study site, lodging and for personal expenses. The recipient can attend any program at the Universidad Internacional anytime during 2012. After completing this experience, the recipient is required to present a session at the 2013 Central States Conference, sharing information and materials obtained from the experience.

ELIGIBILITY FOR ALL CSCTFL SCHOLARSHIPS:

To be eligible for this scholarship, applicants must meet the following criteria:

 be a practicing teacher with a teaching load of at least 50% in the foreign language department;
teach in the Central States Conference region;
be willing to present a 60-minute session at the 2013 Central States Conference.

Other selection criteria include:

1. professional commitment and significant involvement in the teaching of a foreign language (conference/workshop participation, curriculum development) listed in a current professional resume or curriculum vitae (Note: participation in the Central States organization and/or attendance at past conferences will be advantageous and should be noted);

2. evidence of how the experience will enhance his/her teaching explained in a written statement of not more than 200 words; and

3. evidence of institutional support in the form of a letter of endorsement from an administrator or department chairperson.

Language Study Beneficial to Students' Reading Abilities

In a four-year study of the relationship between the length of elementary foreign-language education & English reading achievement, 672 students from a Midwestern elementary school were administered reading tests after they had received two or four years of foreign-language instruction - up to grade six. The sample represented varying intelligence levels. Results indicated that students of average intelligence profited most from the two extra years of instruction in terms of English reading skills.

situation. Muscatine is putting Rosetta Stone into the classroom instead of teachers. They're not eliminating all the other languages, are not testing the kids for level. They have replaced levels 1 and 2 and next year will replace level 3. There may be no change until kids go to college and are not able to get their level. The principal or superintendent has said that Jason Glass promotes the use of Rosetta Stone. When Karla gets approval from Lisa to proceed, she will, and will let people know. Ft. Madison schools had something mentioned about Rosetta Stone. Some small schools in northwest Iowa have been contacted about getting Rosetta Stone, giving them lower prices to get them to use it instead of teachers. May not get official support from colleges and universities. There is an instructor, but she only works as a facilitator. Hard to get something enforced when there are no benchmarks. -Candace volunteered to be Local Chair again and will use the same decorations from this year. Betty Baum-Feree was very helpful to her. Special thanks to her.

-Wade talked to people from other states that liked our conference because there's a feeling that they sense here, something about the luncheon—it seems like we are more of a family. There is some sort of cohesiveness that you don't feel at other conferences. Tracy has only heard positives. Carrie has not heard about parking issues. Contract for next year, they quoted \$13 for parking.

-Need to get the grants taken care of, determine if we will cut ourselves off at paying \$1000 for the grants or fund them fully at a cost of about \$1600.

Learn a new language and get a new soul ~Czech Proverb

"Send Me a Letter" by Wade Petersen

These three fun activities work well as quick warm-ups or cool-downs based on letters and spelling. They give students an opportunity to work with both spelling and vocabulary.

Alpha & Omega - This is actually a popular Japanese game called "Shiri Tori." The teacher divides students into small groups which sit in circles on the floor or arranged desks facing each other. Groups of three or four students work best. One student begins by giving any French/ Spanish/German word he or she wants to. The next student in line must give another word, using the <u>last</u> letter of the previous word. Continue around the circle until someone makes a mistake.

Add a Letter -This is a fun word game that does not necessarily have to relate to any certain set of vocabulary. The teacher begins by dividing students into pairs or teams of three. Each group should have a piece of paper and something to write with. When the teacher tells the groups to begin, they have five minutes (up to 10 minutes if you want) to build a list of French/Spanish/ German vocabulary words, increasing the number of letters in each successive word by one. For example, to begin, each group must think of a one-letter French/Spanish/German word to begin their list. The second vocabulary item in their list should be any word that has two letters. The third item in the list must have three letters, and so on. Words do not have to relate in any way to the previous words in the list.

Students may skip a certain word if they cannot think of one with a certain number of letters, but they will have to come back to it. All words must be valid French/Spanish/German words (plurals are allowed, but no proper nouns).

When time is up, the group with the biggest successive chain of words will win. This means that if a group made it further than any other group up to a word with 10 letters (with words with 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 letters before it), they would win. A group cannot break a chain! For example, if a group has a 15-letter French/Spanish/German word, but no 12, 13, or 14 letter word, the highest point would be 11 (the point at which they broke the sequence of words).

Students could also write their lists on transparencies so they can show and pronounce the words to the class afterward. Teachers could prepare a worksheet with blank spaces for letters (this is easier to fill in and keep track of words).

Where's the Letter? - The teacher divides the class into small groups of three or four students. Each student should have a pencil and paper (or a white board). The teacher then writes a letter on the board. Each student tries to think of a French/ Spanish/German word that contains that letter and then must write that word down (on paper or white board). Students are only given 10 seconds to think of their word (teacher should use a timer). Students score different points based on where the given letter appears in their word. For example, if their word starts with the given letter, the student scores one point; if the given letter is somewhere in the middle of the word, the student scores two points; if the word ends with the given letter, the student scores three points (it helps to put this scoring system on the board). Students keep track of their points and continue to the next round with the teacher giving another letter. Teachers can keep the game this simple or add another layer of challenge. Students could earn multiple points per word depending how many times within the word the letter appears. For example, if a student thinks of a word that begins with and ends with the key letter, the student would then score four points! If the student could think of a word that <u>begins</u> with the letter and has that letter somewhere in the middle, he or she would score three points.

Foreign Language Study and ACT Scores

Analysis of the American College Test (ACT) scores of 17,451 students applying for college admission between 1981 and 1985 found that high school students who studied a foreign language consistently scored higher on ACT English and mathematics components than did students who did not study a foreign language in high school.

Iowa World Language Association Meeting of the Advisory Council and Executive Board Thursday, October 6, 2011 Des Moines Downtown Marriott/Cedar Rapids Meeting Room

-Call to Order – 8:17 PM

-Approval of Minutes of the Last Meeting - Erik Ladner motion to approve, Tracy Dinesen seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report – Waiting on most recent savings acct statement. \$24,121.89 savings balance. Checking account \$38,982.85. This includes \$13,270 from Bea in conference registration. -Spent about \$1000 for administration of web page to Wild Apricot.

-Looking at ways to continue to support teachers and still plan for the future and leaner years. Paid part of Keeka's registration as a Central States board member. Willing to look at other opportunities to invest in projects.

-Biennial report was filed this year, prepared by Jason Dinesen. Liability insurance policies have been paid and updated. Ever year liability is paid, but every 3 years we pay the fraud policy. Ended the year over \$6200 ahead.

-Proposed budget is included in treasurer's report.

-Need to determine how we want to proceed as far as the website. We currently have 1000 contacts purchased. Need to decide if we want to stay with the highest membership. Need to get word out to people to sign up through a communications phase. Let people know how many messages are left on the e-mail blast and that they won't get the blast anymore if they don't sign up. Should have a paper reminder and set up a way for people to register here at the conference with a computer for next year. Grace would be happy to man a computer to do this. Will discuss within the executive board about how to move forward. -Much credit goes to Stacy for her organization. Tracy Dinesen motion to approve Stacy's report, Erik Ladner seconded. Motion carried.

Grants – Grace Valdez

4 grant applications were received. One was for \$100 for a subscription to a website, funds for

books in Spanish, a couple others with technology/cameras. Decided to split up the funds and distribute the funds fairly. Just need the executive board to act. \$1600 in grant requests came in.

-Need to loosen up the reins on funds. We should be spending our money when we can do good things with it.

Registration – Bea Houston 318 registered as of Tuesday night. She estimates that we have about 325.

Exhibitors - Julie Wilhelm

-21 exhibitors, down 1 from last year. Contacted all the exhibitors who did not respond personally. Some have a rotation basis, every 3rd or 4th year, so they don't come every year. For some the schedules just didn't work. Technology related exhibitor is new. UNI did not come back. Bulletin – Julie Wilhelm -Julie had already sent advertising form to advertisers. Information had been sent in June. She already had checks. Julie put their logos on the website, but it isn't the same as having a print ad. Need to look at our pricing so that it is fair. There should be a counter on the newsletter to see how many visitors there are. We should lower or raise the rate accordingly. Exhibitors already get an ad in the program. -November 15 is the next deadline. Pictures of the next award winners, etc. July 1 is the new

Fall Bulletin deadline. Anyone can submit articles, should include a note on the website. -No indenting or bullets for submissions, don't format in any way. 2 spaces between paragraphs. Attach as a Word document with nothing special. Pictures are fine. Word attached to e-mail, use JPG file formats. Identify who people are in pictures. Registration form when it has background and such is difficult to include.

Local Chair - Candi Sherwood

-New reception for presenters. Hospitality room for presenters (Waterloo Room) will have a note for that. Snacks and beverages will be included. Continental breakfast, beverage service will be included. Supplies and last minute needs can be addressed there. Program Chair – Kerisa Baedke

-At a glance will be located at registration. In the afternoon, Davenport and Dubuque are combined. Ellen Schrager is presenting in ballrooms, so had additional spots opened. There is a lot of variety in the program that there may not be an issue with having rooms that aren't big enough. Saturday, the rooms are not combined. FLES and Chinese teachers will be having meetings on Saturday during the blank spots.

- Great sessions were presented, and many of them are new. There were more sessions proposed than what there were spots. Appreciate teachers who have students present. One student presenter is back again to present. Students set things in early! Student sessions tend to be more language-specific and topic specific. May need to come up with a rubric as to how program is determined.

- Printing was done early and so stuffing was done early. Typically, folders are stuffed at the conference.

- Poster sessions, conversation groups, could be a possibility. Set a time when they need to be in an area to look at posters and ask questions. Takes away fear and pressure of presenting. Need easels available. Some people do 2-3 sessions, have people set a preference.

-She and Anne Lair are co-presidents. Have new Facebook, need more Likers, go to their page and like them. Jason Noble is working on a website for AATF Iowa based on WI. Want to know about new French teachers in the state and get to know them well. French contest, oral contest at UNI April 28, Tete a Tete at UNI is April 21st. AATF in Chicago this year.

AATG - Susan Sandholm-Peterson

-Spring meeting at Central College. Also have a Facebook page. Urbandale has reinstated the German program they were going to cut. Waukee seems to be very strong. Have good connections with colleagues at other schools and universities.

AATSP – Maggie Voy

-Has met 3-4 times since IWLA. Planning a retreat perhaps to Chicago. As time goes on, switch to Kansas City, Omaha, Minneapolis. Hook into city cultural fairs, etc. that are going on. ACTFL – Elizabeth Zwanziger Page

-November $18^{\text{th}} - 20^{\text{th}}$. Chen is speaker. 6000 people expect and 600 sessions. Mandarin and Chinese are about 80% of presentations, half of the remainder are Spanish. Late September, Appropriations Committee, zeroes out all of the funding for FLAP grants. No funding for new FLAP programs and may discontinue the current funds.

Middle School – Susan Sandholm Peterson -Has tried to gather numbers. She has a Wiki page, and nothing seems to resonate. Susan has stickers. If people teaching at Middle School level, Susan is going to give them a sticker for their nametags so that people can at least know each other.

Central States – Kat Dierking -Could not attend meeting, but will be presenting tomorrow on Central States.

Private Colleges - Coralie Turner

-Wants to encourage more private college people to come to IWLA. Went to Council on Independent Colleges meeting in the spring. Sign language is the fastest-growing language in the liberal arts area, important especially with parentsto-be. Schools are not only preparing people to attend the public universities. Amazed how many there are in the state, but not represented here. Finding out about it at national conferences—lots of private colleges don't have the money. UNI's department is now combined with TESOL-English and the head of the department is the head of the English department. No more institutes abroad. Only summer courses available.

-Pam Wesley from U of I will be a great outreach per-

Son. Iowa State will have a table, always has been active. Dept. Head, Mark Rectanus, sent a letter that will be given out tomorrow. U of I does not have a table. U of I faculty do not get reimbursed to attend in-state conferences. At U of I, College of Education people are not connected to the Department of Modern Languages. Terri has a huge enrollment of teachers in methods classes. Language numbers are dropping and are now maybe considering connection with education.

-Russell Gammon Director of Division of World Languages and Cultures, wants to know what he can do for outreach to language teachers. Plans to reach out to IwLA however possible. For Iowa, teachers are his number one source. Can earn credits to count toward general education if students have taken 4 years of a foreign language. Guidance counselors don't always get to pass it on. Iowa has very strong program in teaching methodology. If there is anything we would like Terri to talk to him about, she is glad to do so.


